Instructions for case analysis

- Try to give equal space and effort to each case question.
- Note where your response to each specific question begins.
- Be as concise and direct as possible. Introductory statements or prefaces to answers should be limited. Get right to the point.

- Avoid summarizing the case facts or storyline. Assume your group mates and teacher know this information and strive to go beyond that to analyze, using case concepts, what is going on.
- Use the case to apply core concepts from the course notes, text, lectures, readings, and web sources.
- More specifically, learn to speak the "Psychology" language, expressing your thoughts using the course's concepts, terms, phrases, vocabulary, and ideas.
- Ask yourselves, "What concepts from these readings and materials could we apply to this case? What frameworks could we use to interpret or explain what's occurring? How can we express what's going on in the language of Psychology?"
- When answering questions that ask you to identify strengths and weaknesses or to assess effectiveness, ask yourselves, "What concepts or tools have I learned that would help me assess the extent to which something is effective or not?"

Six cases are as follows:

Case 1. Academic Woes (Struggling Academically).

Case 2. The Non-Cooperation Clause (Overcommitted Student Leaders).

Case 3. The Group "But" Head (Brainstorming Derailed).

Case 4. This is Ridiculous! (Rude Behavior).

Case 5. Productivity Over Personality (The Impact of Charisma).

Case 6. Micromanaging Mayhem (Student Leader Doing It All).
